Ntuli Kapologwe Director of Preventive Services Ministry of health – Tanzania

Dr. Kapologwe, Director of Preventive Services at the Ministry of Health, is a distinguished Public Health Specialist with extensive leadership experience. He has contributed over 50 articles to peer-reviewed journals and serves on the editorial board of the East African Journal of Applied Health Monitoring and Evaluation. With a PhD from the University of Dodoma, his research focuses on the impact of Direct Health Facility Financing in Tanzania. 




Developing Implementation practice and research capacity in primary health care in Tanzania. A road map for change

Aim of the Forum

Throughout the globe, governments and health systems are facing significant challenges in providing high-quality and equitable healthcare services. Challenges with implementation is global and stretches across different parts of the health system. Over the past decades, universal health coverage has been proposed to also require the development of contextualized evidence in the search for local solutions and innovation. Implementation research has been put forward as crucial in global health as it tackles the so called know-do gap in real-world contexts by addressing the practicalities of achieving health goals. With implementation research gaining more attention, resulting in a better understanding of what affects implementation and how implementation can be planned the field lacks a shared understanding and a clear way forward to reconcile this gap. Further, as far as capacity building is concerned, more efforts have been directed towards building capacity for implementation research by training researchers or trained professionals to implement specific interventions as opposed to building capacity amongst front-line staff on different levels on evidence-informed implementation. The aim of this forum is therefore to share, a road map for developing Implementation practice and research capacity in primary health care in Tanzania.

Contracting out of Health Services: Towards Improvement of Quality Healthcare in Zanzibar

Aim of the Forum

Contracting out health services has proven to be an effective strategy for enhancing service delivery and improving patient outcomes in healthcare systems. In recent years, Zanzibar has increasingly adopted outsourcing models within its healthcare sector, engaging in partnerships with private entities and NGOs to strengthen service provision and meet growing healthcare demands. This forum will examine the implementation of contracting out strategies in Zanzibar's healthcare system, highlighting both the successes achieved and the challenges faced. Use, Access, and Delivery of Emergency Contraceptives in Tanzania

Aim of the Forum

Emergency contraception (EC) is the type of modern contraception whereby any device or drug is used as an emergency procedure to prevent pregnancy after unprotected sexual intercourse. These ECs when used in a timely manner, provide a significant opportunity to avoid unintended pregnancy by 95%. Nearly half of the pregnancies across the world are unintended pregnancies, the rates are higher in adolescence compared to all women. The situation is worse in developing countries with about half of all pregnancies among adolescents being unplanned. This study was set out to determine the use of emergency contraceptives, and the practice and behaviour of seeking emergency contraceptives in the community and identify challenges associated with the use, access and delivery of emergency contraceptives in Tanzania




Advancing progress towards scalable approaches to improve RMNCH-FP service use among adolescent and young mothers


In many settings, young mothers ages 15-24 are vulnerable to poor maternal outcomes, including rapid repeat pregnancies, and are less likely to use RMNCH-FP services than older and multigravida mothers. Dedicated interventions have shown promise to improve use of health services during the postnatal period, including postpartum family planning (PPFP) among first-time mothers. Yet many complex interventions have proven challenging to scale beyond small pilot areas or to sustain beyond donor funding ends. What could more scalable approaches to improve PPFP for first-time mothers look like, and could these lighter-touch interventions prove effective? In this forum we will explore insights into scalable community and facility-level approaches to improve uptake of PPFP among first-time mothers from the Connect Project in Kongwa and Bahi councils in Dodoma, Tanzania. We'll dig into key trade-offs to improve scalability, the vision for institutionalization and sustainability in Tanzania context, and will highlight results, learnings and recommendations from implementation and evaluations.




During the COVID-19 pandemic, countries with fragile health systems struggled more than those with resilient infrastructures. To prepare for future health threats, strengthening both human and animal health systems is essential. Funded by the CDC and Global Fund's C19-RM mechanism, the Enhancing Global Health Security (eGHS) project collaborated with Tanzanian authorities to build resilient systems focused on laboratories and surveillance. The project's four objectives included improving laboratory systems and linking them to surveillance networks. It also supported malaria surveillance innovations and piloted AI for event-based surveillance. 

Improved perinatal and maternal survival after Saferbirth implementation

Aim of the Forum

The forum aims to highlight the Safer Births Bundle of Care program's impact on improving mother and newborn survival in high-burden regions of Tanzania. Through a three-year stepped-wedge cluster-randomized study in 30 hospitals, the program demonstrated significant reductions in perinatal and maternal deaths. The bundle's success was driven by continuous quality improvement efforts, including simulation-based training, local data use, and innovative perinatal care tools. Discussions will focus on the program's role in reducing birth-related emergencies and its potential to be a scalable solution for improving outcomes in resource-limited healthcare settings.

Addressing Maternal and Perinatal Deaths in Tanzania: Using Root Cause Analysis Methodology to target support and interventions

Aim of the Forum

Significant progress has been made in enhancing maternal and perinatal health across Tanzania, but some of the regions including Dar es Salaam, Mwanza, and Tabora still face a large burden of preventable maternal and newborn deaths. The USAID Afya Yangu, Mama na Mtoto project, in collaboration with Ministry of Health through Division of Reproductive Maternal and Child Health (DRMCH), utilized a root cause analysis methodology in Dar es Salaam, Mwanza and Tabora to identify the key areas that were contributing to the high number of deaths and used this data to develop recommendations and target project and government support to improve health outcomes. The USAID Afya Yangu, Mama na Mtoto project aligns with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) and supporting the Government of Tanzania to achieve Universal Health Coverage. To achieve SDGs, it is imperative to enhance the access and quality of maternal and perinatal/child healthcare. The continuous collection and use of data is vital to monitor progress and rationalize and prioritize targeted interventions. Understanding the root causes of maternal and newborn deaths can accelerate the progress of Tanzania to reduce maternal and perinatal deaths in the regions.

Beyond AYSRH: A Paradigm Shift in Advancing Adolescent and Youth Well-Being.

Traditionally, governments and youth - focused development organizations have prioritized provision of adolescent and youth sexual and reproductive health (AYSRH) services as means to achieve their well-being. This siloed, single-sector approach has realized limited results and has left young people vulnerable. We argue that AYSRH alone is not enough, the challenges faced by youth and adolescents are multifaceted and can only be addressed through multidimensional interventions beyond AYSRH. Pathfinder and CARE International are organizing a symposium titled; Beyond AYSRH: Paradigm shift in addressing adolescents and youth well-being, as part of the 11th Tanzania Health Summit to underscore the power of collaborative multisectoral approaches in addressing youth and adolescents needs towards meaningful youth empowerment - to achieve collective impact. 


Aim of the Forum



Aim of the Forum

Forum Abstract Community-led monitoring (CLM) of HIV in Tanzania is key to enhancing health services' effectiveness and responsiveness. NACOPHA empowers communities to monitor and advocate for improvements in HIV-related services. Under the HT project, CLM has identified service gaps, stigma challenges, and barriers to care in 325 wards of 65 councils, involving 345 health facilities and 9 higher learning institutions. NACOPHA's efforts have fostered strong partnerships between communities, healthcare providers, and policymakers, ensuring more accountable and patient-centered services, and contributing significantly to Tanzania's goal of ending the HIV epidemic. This Forum will showcase the CLM experience and its impact on the HIV response work in Tanzania, its potential to reach the last mile towards ending the HIV epidemic, and provide an avenue to dialogue on the sustainability of CLM for its potential outcomes and impact in the HIV response by 2030 and beyond.







Strengthening Public - Private Partnership with Afya-Tek to Enhance Coordination and Access to healthcare in Tanzania

The Afya-Tek program, implemented by Apotheker, D-tree, and partners, pioneers a digital intervention that connects private-sector Accredited Drug Dispensing Outlets (ADDOs) with community-based public-sector Community Health Workers (CHWs) and Health Facilities (HFs). The program aims to establish a continuum of care, facilitating standardized healthcare services across public and private sectors. Referral data show the crucial role of ADDOs, with CHWs issuing over 7,465 linkages to ADDOs, referring more than 51,918 individuals to HFs, and ADDOs referring 4,802 to HFs. This collaborative effort helps identify clients with minor illnesses, channeling them to formal healthcare services to save lives.

Towards Achieving HIV Epidemic Control 2030: Magnitude, Impact, and Management Experiences of Virologic Failure in HIV-Infected Individuals on Anti-Retroviral Therapy.

Aim of the Forum

HIV remains a significant public health challenge in Tanzania, with virologic failure (VF) among people living with HIV (PLHIV) on anti-retroviral therapy (ART) impeding epidemic control efforts. VF, defined as a viral load of \geq 1000 copies/mL, increases both the risk of HIV transmission and worsens clinical outcomes. Addressing the behaviors and perceptions of this group is crucial for developing effective interventions. Risky sexual behaviors among PLHIV with VF exacerbate the ongoing spread of HIV, underscoring the need for personalized, client-centered services. Additionally, understanding the experiences of their sexual contacts is essential for comprehensive prevention strategies. To update participants, five key presentations will cover incountry policies, strategies, and clinical guidelines on HIV virologic failure; findings from quantitative and qualitative assessments on VF, risky behaviors, and outcomes; as well as clinical updates, future research directions, and strategies for closing gaps in managing VF for HIV epidemic control.
